he State of California has experienced four consecutive years of below-average rain and snow, and is currently facing

severe drought conditions. On April 1, 2015 to protect California's dwindling water supplies Governor Brown issued a Drought Executive Order that directed the State Water Resources Control Board to implement mandatory water reductions in cities and towns across California to reduce potable urban water usage by 25 percent.

San Ramon's water providers, East Bay Municipal Utility District and Dublin San Ramon Services District, are in full compliance with the new state mandates. The objective is to reduce potable water (suitable for drinking) by 20 percent to avoid critical shortages. For residents, the most significant Water Smart Landscaping change is a complete ban on outdoor



irrigation between the hours of 9:00 am and 6:00 pm and

no irrigation at all within 48 hours of measurable rainfall. You will also need to comply with the 2 non-consecutive days a week maximum watering rule.

There are many simple things residents can do to save water in your daily activities. These include: more water efficient fixtures in your home, locating and repairing small leaks, changing your outdoor landscaping, mulching, and creative re-use of water.

The City is not exempt from these new mandates, and has already taken aggressive steps to reduce water use.

Our eight point plan includes:

- 1. Advise residents and businesses of the water conservation and enforcement requirements and restrictions on private [non-City] property.
- 2. Immediately investigate and repair all City water leaks and breaks with specific priority and staff resource attention to potable accounts.
- 3. Implement mandatory and voluntary water conservation and saving measures as a water customer to achieve further water use reductions.
- **4.** Submit letter of exception to EBMUD on two provisions of their restrictions on selected potable water meter accounts related to irrigation of sports fields.
- **5.** Suspend planting projects including new plantings and renovations in streetscapes until at least November.
- **6.** Educate residents and businesses on the City's efforts on water conservation and drought measurements including signage advising use of recycled and recirculated water systems.
- **7.** Bring forward alternatives to current City projects that may be impacted by the drought restrictions and water conservation measures.
- **8.** Update the City's Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance.

Park Project Updates

In preparation for summer park use, the playgrounds at Old Ranch Park and Richard Fahey Village Green were recently upgraded. Staff conducted neighborhood meetings in September of 2014 to collect input on playground design features. Following approval by both the Parks and Community Services Commission and the City Council, staff worked with the playground installer to finalize the playground designs. Renovations began in March of 2015 and both playgrounds were completed and re-opened to the public in April of 2015.

Parks Make Life Better Events

The "Parks Make Life Better" program started in the fall of 2011. Each year, the City's Public Services staff identifies sites where volunteer assistance in maintaining parks would be beneficial. Some of the tasks for the Parks Make Life Better events are: planting, pruning, spreading mulch, painting fences, sanding, and general cleanup. Staff works each event, alongside volunteers, providing direction and coordination. The Public Services Department has also constructed a dedicated equipment trailer with all of the necessary rakes, shovels, and other tools that participants need.

To date, there have been 22 events at 13 locations, with 733 volunteers providing 1,909 hours of service.

San Ramon Library is Getting a Makeover!

The San Ramon City Council approved \$4.6 million for the construction phase of the library's much anticipated expansion and renovation. The project will create a new state-of-the-art library within the current building. The second floor is being expanded and existing spaces will be repurposed and re-imagined to increase the public space by 7,000 square feet. The plan calls for bright, inviting décor and updated furnishings. It includes

larger spaces for kids and teens, areas for quiet reading, seven study rooms, and technology upgrades and infrastructure to support the community's high expectations for information access.

San Ramon Library closes on Monday, August 17, 2015 and will remain closed through 2016 as the project progresses. During the closure, hours at Dougherty Station Library will be increased to match the current San Ramon Library schedule including Tuesday and Wednesday mornings and Sunday afternoons. Limited library services will also be available at the San Ramon Community Center where library customers will be able to pick up holds, return items, attend regular storytimes, and access laptops for quick hit computing. Property Assessed Clean Energy Project Financing

The San Ramon Climate Action Plan encourages local energy efficient and resource conservation projects as a greenhouse gas reduction strategy. Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) programs can promote local improvement projects by providing an alternative funding mechanism.

PACE programs allow residential and commercial property owners to finance up to 100% of eligible projects with little or no up-front costs. These property improvement loans are paid back over time as a voluntary property tax assessment on the existing property tax bill. Examples of qualified projects include:

- Windows, Skylights, & Doors
- Heating, Ventilation, & Air Conditioning
- Solar Panels
- Roofing & Insulation
- Water Heating
- Artificial Turf
- Drought Tolerant Landscaping
- Drip Irrigation
- Electric Vehicle Charging Stations
- Other qualified projects

Three PACE programs are currently available in San Ramon, each offering a variety of programs, financing options and loan terms. The availability of multiple PACE providers within the City encourages competition and allows property owners to select a program that is best suited to their specific needs.
