

30. What kind of police services will be provided in our neighborhood? Such as control for unruly people in the neighborhood, would it be responded to?
A All police response occurs based on the following priorities: personal safety, property protection and vehicle issues.
31. Will the same services be provided in the Old Ranch Park neighborhood that was provided in the Vista San Ramon neighborhood when the event occurred in Central Park (i.e. private security)?
A The current proposal and budget does not include private security, but could be included as required. The primary function of the private security for the Central Park event was monitoring parking passes at designated road closures. The parking passes were issued by the Vista San Ramon Home Owners Association.
32. Is there an evacuation plan in the event of a disaster
A There is a disaster and evacuation response plan for the City of San Ramon and in the event of any disaster it would be followed.
33. Can police monitors be placed at Austin Creek entrance 3pm-10pm
A The draft traffic plan was designed to give the residents as much access as possible to their neighborhood during this event. However, additional traffic monitoring can be included as required.
34. Will any other cities in the Tri-Valley be hosting a fireworks show in 2014?
A To date staff has confirmed that the following locations will have some kind of fireworks display: Alameda County Fairgrounds, City of Richmond, and Pleasant Hill.
35. Will all sworn police officers be scheduled to work on July 4, 2014?
A Yes, all sworn police officers will be scheduled to work either before, during or after the event.
36. What is the impact of the drought on this plan?
A The drought will not have a specific impact on this event. In the event of significant fire activity or should the San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District deem the conditions to be unsafe, the event will be cancelled.
37. How will hikers be prevented from entering the area through Dougherty Hill trails and the drainage areas?
A City personnel or fencing will be stationed wherever there is a likely breach of people into the shoot site. The fallout zone will have dedicated personnel stationed to maintain a clear fallout zone.
38. Will there be road notifications by regional traffic agencies (like 511.org) because of the road closures? Will they promote the fireworks to the region?
A 511.org and other regional agencies have not distributed information about fireworks related road closures in San Ramon during the past events and there is no intention to utilize this service for this event.
39. What will the impact of the opening of Rancho San Ramon Park on the traffic control plan?
A When Rancho San Ramon Park opens it would likely be a location where the public might go to view the fireworks should Old Ranch Park be selected for the fireworks launch site. The traffic control and security plan will have to be further evaluated to

include any impact of based on the opening of this site.
40. Is there a way to prevent parking on Dougherty Road?
A Police will respond to any parking violation based on the priority of the calls it receives. If needed, additional signage could be placed along Dougherty Road to limit parking.
41. How does the traffic control plan protect private property?
A The traffic control plan for this event was designed to protect both private and public property. A thorough review of the area was conducted and traffic mitigations are recommended to provide a safe event for spectators and the neighborhood.
42. Where have similar fireworks events in residential neighborhoods been held successfully?
A Cupertino, Blackhawk Country Club, San Mateo Highlands, East Palo Alto, Milpitas, Pleasant Hill
43. Will there be surplus fireworks held on site?
A No. Only the fireworks required for the display will be on site.
44. Will Summit View Park be completely fenced off?
A No. A six foot fence along with personnel will be provided from Bridle Court along the northern border of the park to Whitehaven Place blocking all trail access. Barricades will block traffic starting at 6 pm at Timbercreek, Vista Monte and Bent Creek Drive. Vista Monte residents will have access until 45 minutes prior to the event.
45. What impacts will this have on my home owners insurance? Will I need additional riders to cover any potential damage from fireworks?
A The City cannot answer this question.
46. Will the blast zone be wet down?
A The fallout zone can be wet down as needed. San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District Staff will evaluate the location and all recommended mitigations will be implemented for the shoot site location.
47. What will the impact of the fireworks be on the neighborhood below Old Ranch Park (along Alcosta Blvd)?
A The surrounding neighborhoods will likely be impacted by increase in vehicular and pedestrian traffic.
48. Was Rancho San Ramon Community Park considered as a shoot site?
A Rancho San Ramon Community Park is currently under construction and is not owned by the City of San Ramon currently. Once the park is completed and is transferred to the City, it could be considered for a future shoot site location.
49. What is the impact on pets in the neighborhood?
A As with all fireworks shows, pets are often disturbed by the noise.
50. Will there be additional restrooms added in the residential neighborhoods?
A At this time there is not a plan for additional restrooms to be placed in the Old Ranch Park neighborhood.
51. Will the Parks Commission recommendation be made public prior to the City Council Meeting on 2/25?

<p>A The San Ramon Parks & Community Service Commission will make their recommendation during their publicly held meeting on February 12, 2014 at 7:00pm at the City Council Chambers located at 2222 Camino Ramon. The Commission's recommendation will be included in the staff report provided to the City Council and posted prior to their February 25, 2014 meeting. <p>52. Can the event publicity include that there are no fireworks viewing in the Old Ranch neighborhood?</p>
<p>A Yes.</p>
<p>53. Can we create a joint event with Camp Parks?</p>
<p>A Camp Parks is federally owned land operated by the US Army. While the possibility exists of partnering with the Army to host a future fireworks display, it will take City staff quite some time to be able to pursue that course of action.</p>
<p>54. What was the cost of the staff time to prepare this report (80 hours)?</p>
<p>A Staff has spent approximately 215 hours thus far on the 2014 recommendation.</p>
<p>55. What was the cost of the 2013 event? What would be the cost of a ground fireworks display?</p>
<p>A The 2013 event cost was approximately \$45,000. The total cost of a 2014 event including the cost of adding a low level ground pyrotechnical display and related costs is estimated at \$100,000.</p>
